COURSE PREFIX and NUMBER: ART 152

CREDIT HOURS: 3

COURSE TITLE: THEORY AND PRACTICE OF CERAMICS II

PREREQUISITES: ART 151

COURSE DESCRIPTION: Teaches basic hand processes of pottery as applicable to tableware, decorative, functional and non-functional form. Includes throwing, coiling, slab building, and press molding. Generates a fundamental understanding of the craft through physical manipulation of materials, consideration of design techniques and historical example. Provides opportunity to work on original design from the clay to firing or glazing. Lecture 1 hour. Studio instruction 4 hours. Total 5 hours per week.

 - a. Spiral Wedging
 - b. Centering and Opening
 - c. Straight-walled forms
 - d. Curved-walled forms

 - h. Lids
- C. Decorating techniques
- D. Glazing and firing techniques
- E. Personal evaluation of work
